### **Council News**

#### **Tackling a sticky issue** on our high streets

The council is taking on the chewing gum blighting our high streets.

A cleaning team has removed discarded chewing gum and deep cleaned the pavements on **Brentwood High Street and areas** around Brentwood and Shenfield stations, along with installing new signage reminding residents and visitors not to drop their gum.

The work was funded by a £27,500 grant awarded to the council by the Chewing Gum Task Force, set up by Keep Britain Tidy and funded by the major chewing gum producers.



#### Take me to the water

Swimming is a great exercise for everyone. However, for many people with mobility issues getting in and out of the pool can be a challenge.

That is why the council is installing a Poolpod 3 at the Brentwood Centre swimming pool in the New Year, thanks to successful grant funding obtained by the council, in partnership with Brentwood Access Group.

The easy-to-use submersible platform lift provides a flexible and dignified means of entering and leaving the swimming pool for people with limited mobility.

It is suitable for adults and children living with a disability and older people who would benefit from easier access.

The initiative is supported by the Brentwood Community Fund, the Basildon and Brentwood Health Inequalities Fund and the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

#### **Baytree Centre redevelopment to begin** early works

New investment has been approved into the Baytree Centre, working in partnership with Essex Highways, to carry out essential improvements to street furniture, signage, and the environment around the centre.

The Assets, Projects, and Strategy Committee agreed upon this as part of a three-phase delivery approach to progress the redevelopment of the Baytree Centre. The council purchased the shopping centre in 2021 and gained planning permission for a redevelopment scheme last year. The updated phasing recognises the challenging economic environment since the proposals were first put forward in 2022, including higher interest rates and build costs, alongside the needed regeneration and repairs to Brentwood High Street.

Alongside the initial phase, work is now underway on developing a high-quality public realm scheme at the entrance to the Baytree Centre, providing a gateway to the rest of the centre and the wider High Street. This will include engagement with key stakeholders such as Brentwood Connected, Brentwood Access Group and community organisations. The scheme will appropriately incorporate the Chapel Ruins, with their heritage being recognised. It is planned to break ground in the latter period of next year.

Finally, a comprehensive development review of the existing Baytree Centre and the original proposed scheme will be completed. This review will meet the council's ambition to bring forward a diverse tenant mix, including retail and leisure uses, recognising the area's heritage, complementing the High Street and opportunities across the town centre, in any agreed scheme.

# Fleet converted to eco-friendly fuel



The Council has switched its fleet of waste, streetcare and grounds maintenance vehicles from fossil fuel derived diesel to an eco-friendly fuel. The move follows the council's declaration of a climate emergency in June 2023 and is part of its drive to achieve net-zero carbon emissions by 2030.

In 2023, almost 70% (722 tonnes CO2e) of the council's carbon footprint was from the burning of diesel for its waste collection service.

The Brentwood fleet of 56 vehicles, including its waste trucks, is now run on Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil (HVO), a practical and environmentally friendly alternative to diesel for powering vehicles.

Brentwood is the first and only council in Essex to make the full move to HVO. The Council also has seven electric vans.

#### What is HVO?

HVO is derived from vegetable oils and waste fats and provides a 99% reduction in carbon dioxide emissions compared to traditional diesel.

There is also an improvement in air quality when compared with fossil fuel derived diesel as HVO emits 25% less nitrous oxide.

The fuel is made from 100% 'certified' waste material only, that would otherwise end up in landfill causing more harm to the environment. It means reduced emissions, and its longer-term storage stability will make it a complete replacement for diesel fuel.

Unlike electric vehicles, which can be costly and require substantial infrastructure, HVO can be used as a direct replacement for diesel in existing fleets with minimal modifications.

Over the festive period, around 30% more waste is produced in the UK. Food makes up a large portion of this – so, let's make sure we recycle it!

Although Christmas leftovers should be eaten and stored where possible, we know that some food waste is unavoidable. This year, don't put it in your general rubbish bin but use a food caddy.

By using a caddy, the food waste can be recycled into green energy and fertiliser to power Essex.

# Should YOU be taking the Credit?

Are you over State Pension age? Have you checked if you're eligible for Pension Credit?

For pensioners who qualify, Pension Credit could mean an average boost to their income of around £3,900 a year.

It takes just a few minutes to check if you qualify.

## There's more good news

If you do qualify for Pension Credit, it can unlock additional support, including Winter Fuel Payments, help with Council Tax, NHS dental care and, for those over 75, a free TV licence.

### Heat your home for less

Everyone is worried about their energy bills these days. But did you know there are schemes and grants available that can improve the energy efficiency of your home and help cut your bills?

#### **Better Housing Better Health**

Better Housing Better Health (BHBH) have a preventative approach to health and wellbeing. The BHBH service provides residents with a single point of contact to get impartial expert advice to help improve the energy efficiency of their home, save money and improve comfort.



BHBH operates a free call helpline. All advisors are City and Guilds trained energy experts offering bespoke advice on reducing energy bills, improving the energy efficiency of homes and financial help such as:

- Emergency Fuel vouchers
- Free Home energy visits
- Grant funding towards energy bills/debt and other interventions and referrals.

#### ECO4 scheme

The ECO4 scheme offers support to low-income households in improving energy efficiency, by providing retrofit support, funded by your energy suppliers. It covers home improvements, including wall insulation, heat pumps, solar energy panels and boiler upgrades.

To qualify your household must receive at least one of a number of Government assisted benefits and the EPC rating for your home must be D, E, F, or G.

### **Boiler Upgrade Scheme**

The Boiler Upgrade Scheme offers a £7,500 grant for a new heat pump. Recent changes mean more people qualify, and heat pump installations are currently VAT exempt, adding even more savings.

# Brentwood Community Fund projects



Every year, the council provides funding for local charities and community groups with projects that support and improve the lives of residents. The money comes from our Community Fund, in partnership with Axis and Seven Arches Investments Ltd.

This year, a total of 11 local organisations shared the Community Fund pot of £80,000, after successfully bidding for money to fund an array of projects that support many of our most vulnerable residents, help foster community friendship and encourage local people to adopt healthier lifestyles.

Here are a few of the projects the fund supported in 2024.

# Helping SNAP to support families



Money from the Community Fund is being used to support much needed weekly pre-school sessions for children with a range of disabilities, run by SNAP.

Pre-school sessions give parents a chance to meet each other and get support from SNAP Family Support Advisers while their children enjoy the activities. Children have access to a wide variety of toys as well as the centre's specialist facilities, including a Multi-Sensory Room, soft play, and interactive floor.

The charity is based in Brentwood but works right across Essex helping thousands of families with children and young people who have any additional need or disability. SNAP was started by a group of local parents coming together around a kitchen table and is now celebrating its 30th anniversary. It has developed into a crucial service for many local families. No formal diagnosis or professional referral is necessary to access SNAP services, available to families with children and young people aged 0 to 25.

# Healthy eating on the menu

Since 2018, the Daily Bread Café in Hutton has run a food hub where it provides meals and other essentials to people who find themselves in crisis.

The cafe, at St Peter's Church, is supported by volunteers and donations. It is not a food bank but does provides nutritious meals to anyone who needs the support.

Many people on low incomes find it difficult to ensure they are eating healthily, and the Daily Bread team successfully bid for a grant from the Community Fund to support free workshops on budgeting skills and healthy eating for families.

The café, which is open six days a week, also plays host to activities for children, families and the local community.

#### **Diary of a Princess**

The fascinating but little-known story of an Indian Princess buried at All Saints' church near Brentwood is being told, with help from a grant from the Community Fund.

Many visitors to the graveyard of All Saints will have seen the headstone of Helen Randhir Singh Ahluwalia of Kapurthala and wondered about her story.

Princess Helen was the youngest daughter of Randhir Singh, ruling Maharajah in the state of Kapurthala. His third wife was the daughter of Robert Hodges, a British civil servant. After his death, Randhir Singh's widow and their three daughters, including Helen, settled in London.

Helen mixed with the elite of London society, but her life was tragically cut short by tuberculosis aged 23, in October 1887.

The Community Fund grant to the Essex Cultural Diversity Project supported an amazing event at Doddinghurst Village Hall earlier this year, bringing together people from the local parish and visiting Sikh communities.

The Global Village event, in honour of Princess Helen, included Indian acrobatics by Circus Raj, African storytelling, Indian food and Henna hand painting.

There was also a pop-up exhibition and a talk about the princess and her amazing life.

#### Cycling for life

Trailnet is a community interest company (CIC) dedicated to transforming people of all ages and abilities into cyclists.

The company successfully bid to the Community Fund for a grant to fund a heavily discounted bike scheme for families and people in receipt of benefits and with long-term health conditions.



To be eligible, families and individuals must live in the borough of Brentwood and meet ONE of the following criteria: Be in receipt of Housing Benefit, or in receipt of Universal Credit, or have children in receipt of free school meals, or have a long-term health condition that would benefit from increased physical activity.

Trailnet hopes to provide 30 bikes for local people by Spring next year. Applicants also receive a helmet, lock and lights.

Trailnet organises regular group rides, cycling lessons, bike hiring, community events and bike recycling programmes as well as other two-wheel related activities, helping people lead healthier lives, make new friends and discover nature.

As part of the scheme, participants have the opportunity to take part in three group rides and/or training sessions.
